If you attended the March Sacramento Ragtime Society meeting, you may have noticed Steve Drivon playing a beautiful silver euphonium. Well, there is a story behind that instrument. In our family, every child and grandchild is offered an instrument. It's not "Do you want to play an instrument?" but "Which instrument do you want to play?" It so happens that all of the school-aged grandkids play something.

My sister, Georgie, has three grandkids and the trumpet and flute players were taken care of from spare instruments that came out of closets. However, it was when Max, her oldest grandson, fell in love with a baritone that we knew we were in trouble-Big shiny trouble! Those instruments are huge and we didn't have one stuffed under a bed, or hiding behind a hamper. So, my sister and I decided that Max, who starts high school in the fall, needed his very own instrument and we were going to make it happen. That was where Steve Drivon came in.

Knowing next to zip about lower brass, I asked Steve to advise us. We had no idea of where to start. Steve's reply was "E-Bay and put me on it!" So before the bidding even began, Steve spent a lot of time explaining and demonstrating from the myriad of lower brass instruments that

are found at his and Robyn's home, and we settled on a euphonium, the instrument with the most opportunities to play. But, if you remember the February SRS meeting, I have to add that taking advice from someone who sometimes confuses a slide



whistle with a trombone did take a leap of faith.

The chase was on. Steve would send me listings of various instruments, which I'd forward on to Georgie in Gresham, Oregon, but they would go too high in the end. Steve would tell us the maximum amount to spend on each instrument so that we didn't get carried away in the bidding process.

Finally, a listing for a Blessing, silver tenor Euphonium came up and no one was bidding on it. After Steve had settled all doubts with the owner on the horn's condition, we got the word to go for it.

My sister put in a bid near the end of the bidding session and the two of us got on the phone to count down the final seconds. Bingo! "Euphie," the silver euphonium, was ours. "Euphie" went directly to Steve who polished the dickens out of it, oiled the valves, and got it into great playing condition. He even added a gold mouthpiece.

On Saturday, April 18th, we all met up for a family wedding where we presented Max with the surprise of his life. He was so touched and so excited and the rest of us were misty eyed when he played his first notes. I was told that when our combined grandkids (Georgie's and mine) had finished a late night swim at the hotel, there was Max, in a wet bathing suit, playing the last few notes of the day on his new euphonium. It doesn't get any better than this! And Steve, we can't thank you enough!

Behind the Scenes at SRS Headquarters

Many readers may wonder why the newsletter for a group based in Sacramento has an Oakland postmark and a Grass Valley return address. Merv Graham has handled subscriptions for many years, so when the Post Office needs to return a newsletter, it's logical for it to go to Grass Valley, where Merv lives.

Since 1997, when he began a sevenyear stint as newsletter co-editor, Oaklander Marty Eggers has handled the mailing. He continued with this task even after Lewis Motisher became editor in 2002, initially because his local printer, Piedmont Copy, had provided high-quality duplication that was inexpensive and reliable. More recently, Marty developed a system for printing addresses directly on the newsletters, a savings of both time and money. Piedmont Copy continues to be the printer for the SRS newsletter.

For many years now, the usual mailing date has been the Wednesday before the SRS session, but through an unforeseen set of circumstances, the April edition of the SRS newsletter was very late. We believe the delay was far from entirely their fault, but the printer has refused payment for printing that issue, as apology for their part in the newsletter being late and as a gesture of goodwill.

Marty assures us he will take extra precautions to avoid the problems that occurred, and will also have a better backup plan to help ensure the newsletter is mailed on time in the future.

Finally, in consideration of the fact that we all volunteer our limited free time for SRS, we humbly ask your patience and understanding if the newsletter should happen to be mailed late on occasion. Be assured that we have done and will continue to do everything we can to stay on schedule.

It was a fabulous afternoon and a true treat to hear Virginia perform solo (she's so busy playing with Devil Mountain, The Crown Syncopators, the Tichenor Family, or with other musicians at Pier 23). Given that she'd hardly had time to recover from her heavy tax season responsibilities, it seemed tantamount to a miracle that she was in top form and created such a delightful afternoon for us ragtime fans. What a pro!


